On most Mondays and Fridays, you'll find Lynn Wetmore of Trumbull with Academy students at Vazzy's, Fairfield U, or any of our partnering vocational worksites, helping to oversee activities and offer support. Our safe environment policy mandates that there be two adults with students at each worksite in our Vocational Training Program, and we depend on dedicated volunteers like Lynn to assist. "She's been a wonderful, consistent volunteer over these past five years," said Darlene Jacabacci, Coordinator of the program. "Lynn always makes herself available."

Lynn felt a void in her life when her son, Justin, who had special needs, passed away. "I needed to be somewhere that I could feel his presence," she said. "My faith led me to Saint Catherine's. By volunteering at the school I knew I would be giving back to the church community as well as helping these special children."

In recognition for her service, the Center nominated Lynn to receive the Saint Augustine Medal of Service in November. The award is presented annually by Bishop Caggiano to nominees from across the Diocese.

"It is rewarding to feel that my little part—and I mean little!—is appreciated by both the staff and the children," Lynn said. "I love to sometimes get a hug, a laugh, or a big smile and thank you from the kids. I like being that extra person/friend for them to talk to and share their stories with. It truly makes my day."







"I Have a Dream": Celebrating Martin Luther King, Jr.

"We wanted to create something meaningful that would honor what MLK fought for, which was unity and equality for all," Tra'Nisha said. "So we used symbolic colors, such as green for harmony, yellow for happiness, red for love, and blue for peace."
