Saint Catherine Academy has been granted re-approval as a private special education program from the Connecticut State Department of Education. This status was granted for another 5 years, which is the maximum length allowable. Approval by the Department of Education is an important signal for students and families that a school offers a high-quality education and meets important benchmarks in areas including administration, climate and culture, and curriculum and instruction.

"The designation of approval by the Department of Education is important because it allows Saint Catherine Academy to partner with local school districts in receiving students who need more specialized instruction and small, nurturing environment," said Helen Burland, Executive Director.

This is the culmination of a yearlong process that began with self-evaluation, review of records and documentation, and school-wide discussions around opportunities for improvement. An extensive application was submitted in March followed by a two-day site visit in May that included class observations, documentation review, and staff interviews. The site visit concluded with a presentation of findings by the visiting team. A highlight of these comments concluded that Saint Catherine Academy is a safe, student-centered school with a strong sense of commitment and pride in the community. They also recognized the warm, welcoming, supportive environment with staff highly committed to the well-being of each student. "We saw evidence of a collaborative, supportive environment with staff consistently committed to the well-being of students," reported Dori Papa, Education Consultant, Connecticut State Department of Education Bureau of Special Education.

This is a significant achievement and we are proud to have met the rigorous standards. Our mission is to provide high quality education to support all our students, and this accreditation further validates our commitment to excellence. "The successful completion of the recent approval process is truly a testament to the whole Saint Catherine Academy team and the quality of our programs.
